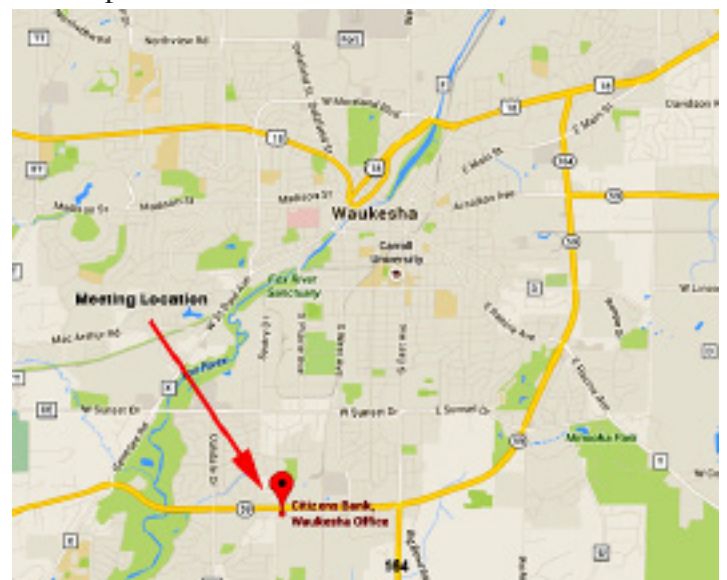

Why I Love to Photograph Humming Birds

My first meeting with “The Hummers” was in 2017 at a workshop in British Columbia with John Gerlach.

I immediately fell in love with them and have since studied them and love them even more!

These little birds are so extraordinary! Hummers are only found in the Western Hemisphere. There are 328 species with only 16 species in the US. The Ruby-Throated Hummingbird is the only one in the Eastern half of the U.S. and Canada. They are one of the smallest birds weighing approximately 3 grams for the male and 3.5 grams for the female.

It’s pretty easy to tell the male from the female Ruby Throated Humming Bird, the male has the beautiful iridescent feathers at the throat called the “gorget”, the female does not. The adult male has tail feathers tipped in black and the females tail feathers are tipped white. The females are larger than the males and the young, no matter what gender, look like the female. The female starts to build the nest of plant down, grasses, spiderwebbing and silk from cocoons. Nests are rarely seen because they are the size of a quarter. After mating, there is no pair bonding, because the male is gone and the female works on her nest. The female hummer has only 2 eggs that are the size of a navy bean. She incubates them for 12 to 15 days only leaving to eat. She alone feeds them and takes care of them for three weeks. After that, they are the competition and are chased out.

Ruby Throated Humming Birds do not like the cold so they migrate south for the winter from Central America, Mexico to Panama. They do not fly in flocks. Through banding efforts, the trip can be as long as 3000 miles.

Hummingbirds do not live on sugar-water alone. It comprises only about 20% of their diet. They eat flying insects for protein, vitamins and minerals. They are genetically programmed to fly south so keeping feeders out does not interfere with that. They also remember from year to year where the food is and will return. Pat Toicen-Dycee
